Enfield Elementary Basketball

Enfield Summer Day Camp

I know, I know – it's snowing and I am writing about summer camp! This is a FYI for new families and new fee information for returning families.

The Enfield Community Council has a summer day camp program for children ages 4-13 years old. It is a 6-week program that begins on July 7 and ends August 15, 2014. It will be held at the Robert Treman State Park's lower level (the North Shelter Pavilion).

The campers start their day at 8:45 a.m. with a cold breakfast and have activities until 11:30 which is lunchtime (except for field trips, all lunches are hot food items). The daily activities include a combination of most of the following: sports, arts, science, sewing, cooking, journal writing, singing, hiking, literacy activities, swimming, outdoor education (the last activity is for campers 9 years old and up). We have access to open fields, creeks and the playground. There will be field trips to Hangar Theater, Sciencenter, Taughannock Park, Watkins Glen, miniature golf, Greenwood Park, bowling and some new trips.

All fees are per child as follows:

Base camp program (9:00 a.m. – 3:00 p.m.) \$325 for all 6 weeks for Enfield residents and \$400 for all 6 weeks for non-residents (includes park entrance pass)

Before camp care (7:30 a.m. - 8:45 a.m.) \$150 for 1-5 days/week for 6 weeks

After camp care (3:00 p.m. – 5:30 p.m.) \$200 for 1-5 days/week for 6 weeks for Enfield residents and \$225 for non-residents.

The Community Council is offering a prepay reduced rate for the BASE FEE ONLY. If the base fee is paid by May 31 the fee is \$15 less (Residents \$310/child and Non-Residents \$385/child).

Completed applications and all fees are due in by June 15 to guarantee space at camp. If you want to start to make payments several months before the start of camp please contact me to make arrangements. If you currently receive temporary assistance or need help with the cost of childcare, you may be eligible for assistance through DSS. Please contact Vera Howe-Strait or DSS, 274-5677, for further information. The DSS acceptance letter must be received by Vera before camp starts.

The Enfield Community Council strives to provide activities that are free or low cost. It is our goal that no one is turned away because of the inability to pay. Please contact Vera if there are any issues regarding income and/or ability to pay.

Thanksgiving 2014 in our New Community Building

The Enfield Community Council, a not-for-profit corporation, which does programming for the youth and residents of our community, is moving along in its plans to build a new community building to expand our ability to provide programming to the residents of Enfield. We have hired Noah Demerest of Stream, Collaborative as our architect. He will produce architect renderings of the building, a floor plan to submit for a building permit and coordinate construction details. John Anderson, PE is doing a septic plan for us and David Dietrich, partner in Moosewood and Enfield resident is creating the plans for our certified kitchen. Torri Bennington, graphic artist, has agreed to help us with a fundraising brochure. Carrie Pollack of Miller, Mayer is giving us legal advice. Committee members are approaching the USDA and local lenders about a mortgage. Fund raising will begin soon.

In looking into siting for our building, we were very interested in putting this building in the center of Enfield. We approached a landowner who did not want to sell us land in a central area. We then approached the Ithaca City School District about using part of the Elementary School land. They were very excited about partnering in our project. We plan to enter into a long term lease agreement with the ICSD for part of the land to the south of the school building on which to build the community center. As a plus, this will not take more land off the tax rolls.

We'll be asking community members to add their skills to our building as we finalize our plans. Stay tuned and look forward to a community Thanksgiving this November!

A few odds and ends of Enfield History Sue Thompson, Enfield Town Historian

In 1896 there were two women listed as "Postmaster" in Tompkins County. Deborah Earl Budd was postmaster of the Enfield Falls Post Office and Mrs. Ella Drake of Myers, NY. Deborah's parents were John and Mehitable Ganoung Earl. She had 8 siblings, according to various years of the Federal U.S. Census. In 1882 Deborah and her husband Charles used the parlor of their home as the post office. Charles Budd was listed as Postmaster in 1882. After Charles death in 1896, Deborah was appointed Postmaster. This post office was open until 1902. Deborah died March 15, 1903 at their family home in Enfield Falls. Deborah and Charles are buried at Grove Cemetery in Trumansburg. Deborah was one of a small but growing number of women postmasters in the United States. A word from the Enfield Town Board Minutes – April 1915 - A letter from the State Board of health was presented and read involving suggestions for a "cleanup" day (April 22) and offering many suggestions. Chair appointed Fred G. Rumsey and Harry Havens as a committee to take charge of House Cleaning. Health Officer, Dr. David Robb, to draft suggestions in the form of a notice with such other helps as he may add for the benefit of this special committee in regard to its health conditions. Town Clerk, Devoe Rumsey, be instructed to have printed and mailed to each householder of the town a copy of the notice. Carried and moved. According to the Reading Times, Pennsylvania on April 22, 1915, there was a national call for more attractive surroundings and better health in communities through the U.S.. They referred to diphtheria and other health ailments in the article.

June 24, 1905 a special meeting of the Town Board was called for. The purpose of the meeting was discussing fixing roads that had been washed out in the town. A Committee of two was appointed to carry out road repair decisions. Three days before June 21, 1905, it rain heavily in Tompkins County. On the 21st a heavy rain storm passed over the south-central part of New York State. Flooding destroyed roadways and bridges in Enfield, Newfield (destroyed highways and 7 bridges), and Dryden. In Ithaca the waters of Six Mile Creek rushed down upon the city carrying away dams, bridges and filling many dwelling houses with water. There was over \$100,000 worth of damage in Ithaca.

Beginner Maple Production Workshop

January 14, 6-8 p.m. Seneca County Cornell Cooperative Extension, 305 Main Street Shop Center, Waterloo, NY. Are you interested in tapping maple trees in the backyard or getting started in small-scale commercial maple syrup production? CCE Seneca is offering a Beginner Maple Production Workshop. Mr. Stephen Childs, New York State Extension Specialist in the Department of Natural Resources at Cornell University; will be the presenter. The workshop will cover a variety of aspects of maple syrup production including: why make maple syrup, tree identification, tree health, tapping, sap collection and handling, boiling, energy efficiency, finishing and grading syrup, canning, marketing and regulations. This workshop is aimed at the small or beginning maple producer and would be useful to the homeowner looking to tap a few trees in the backyard or someone wanting to start small-scale commercial maple production. BF 203: Holistic Financial Planning: Building Profit into the Picture

Jan. 14 - Feb 18. "The Holistic Management Framework--sorting expenses, planning for profit, and identifying logjams and weak links--has provided the biggest insights for me. I'm pretty good with numbers and spreadsheets, but the course gave me tools to think about the numbers and understand what they are telling me." -farmer participant from 2012 BF 203 course. If you complete the course you will: Have a written statement of your family's values and vision and know how to use it to guide financial and overall farm decision-making. Have a written Annual Financial Plan mapping out your planned profit, income streams, and expenses (this plan doubles as a cash-flow statement in your business plan and is one of the main documents a lender will want to see). Understand that all expenses are not created equally, and how to prioritize and cut them. Know how to monitor your plan so that you can correct your course when you start to go off-plan. While helpful, no prior experience with Holistic Management is required! The course runs Tues. Jan. 14 - Feb 18, with webinars once weekly on Tues. evenings from 6:30-8:00pm EST. The cost is \$200, and multiple people from the same farm may participate without paying extra. Biological Control of Stink Bugs

Growers who use biological control methods could stop brown marmorated stink bug (BMSB), reduce costs, and put fewer chemicals into the environment. Learn to identify several native predators and parasitoids of BMSB in various crops and nurseries. Using less insecticide could help these natural enemies of BMSB. Methods such as cultural controls, trap cropping, and monitoring as part of a biological control strategy could keep BMSB populations in check. Buses run 22 hours a day, seven days a week and 360 days a year, only shutting down five days a year to allow all of TCAT's employees to observe major holidays: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day,

Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day. Ride cost per adult is \$1.50 if boarding the bus in Zone 1, generally downtown Ithaca, or \$2.50 if boarding the bus in Zone 2.
